## Annual awards: Celebrating the best of the best in preservation

AY IS NATIONAL
Preservation Month, and
that's when the Eureka
Heritage Society will honor deserving recipients during its annual
Preservation Awards program. It
will be held at 10 a.m. on Saturday,
May 11, at Dick Taylor Craft
Chocolate, 333 First St.

The awards are central to the Heritage Society's mission and recognize the efforts of those who work to maintain the historic fabric of our unique city.

This year's four award recipients include a very familiar former bank; a restored Victorian duplex that shines in its neighborhood; a business that has provided restoration materials to the community for decades; and a building whose new owners have incorporated historical elements with harmonizing new materials to create a welcoming space for their sweet business.

The winners are: the Clarke Historical Museum, whose home is the former Bank of Eureka building; Shawn Elsworth and Alpha Torres Leon for the duplex at 1811-19 California St.; Tim Thornton, Daniel Jones, and Shawnee Alexandri, the former and current owners of Mad River Woodworks; and Adam Dick and Dustin Taylor for the new home of Dick Taylor Craft Chocolate.

How does the Heritage Society determine who will receive awards? We base it on more than just fresh paint and a new roof, although these are vital to maintaining any building. Often honored structures are prominent in Eureka – but not always. There may be an individual who has quietly restored the interior of their home or someone who has furthered the cause of historic preservation in the city.

## PRESIDENT'S CORNER

# Fifty years of preservation success

RECENTLY reread a 50-year-old publication that was put out by the now-defunct Eureka Redevelopment



Agency, which was part of the Department of Community Development. It was titled "Architectural Heritage: An initial visual survey of significant buildings in the core area. Eureka, California 1974."

This survey was part of the vital early work that built a foundation for preservation success within the city. It was an outgrowth of an earlier survey performed for Eureka beginning in August 1973. (Which was also the birth year of the Eureka Heritage Society). Known as the "Relocatable Significant Buildings Survey," it was concerned with structures of architectural significance that lay within the right-of-way of Caltrans' proposed freeway bypass.

The 1974 publication covered the rest of the Redevelopment Area not threatened by the bypass. The criteria of the '74 survey focused on which structures were irreplaceable. To determine this, a list of criteria and useful definitions was created.

The work focused on the existence of relatively unbroken groups of neighborhoods, those that are particular to Eureka and contain handsomely stylistic specimens. In this survey, preservation was stated to be an "ongoing engagement with a richly diverse architectural heritage."

At the time, almost all the 57 buildings in the survey were in use,

often as originally intended. What strikes me now is that all but three still exist, and none of them were demolished for new construction; they were lost to accidental fire. The remaining 54 are still in use, most as originally intended.

Thankfully, the freeway bypass was abandoned in the 1990s. This not only saved buildings in its path but many other fine historic structures in adjacent areas. That nearmiss offered more inspiration on Eureka's preservation path.

Over the decades, I believe the City of Eureka has experienced a great deal of preservation success thanks to a mindset that was developed 50 years ago.

## Architectural tours are on the way

## Remembering some of Eureka's earliest homes

HESE PHOTOGRAPHS CAPTURE A moment in time when some of the earliest homes built in Eureka were still standing. They come from a photograph album compiled in the late 1930s by Carol Lee Nelson (1924-2013), and it was donated to the Eureka Heritage Society by her daughter. The album may have been a project for school

or Camp Fire Girls.

All the houses were built in the 1850s or early 1860s. They all are greatly simplified versions of Greek Revival and Gothic Revival architecture, which was fashionable during the mid-19th century.

THE BULLOCK HOME was located on the west side of H Street near Third Street. Mr. Bullock was the town's postmaster toward the end of his life. His daughter. Edna Freitas, still lived in the house when this photo was taken. Notice the dome of the old Eureka City Hall that is just visible in the background on the left.



THE GEORGE MACFARLANE HOME, built around 1853, was located on First Street near the current Humboldt County Library. The MacFarlanes were pioneers in the logging business. Their daughter, a Mrs. McCann, still lived in the house when this photo was taken. The house burned down in 1982. A reproduction of it was built on the same site, 410 Second St., but none of the original materials survived.



THE COUSINS HOME, located at Third and M streets, was built by a man who was the captain of the steamer Humboldt. This is the only house that is still standing, but it has been heavily modified as is unrecognizable from this original version.



THE HANNA HOME was located on Second Street between K and L streets. It was built by Judge Hanna, who was said to have been married to one of the daughters of Betsy Ross.



THE GRAHAM HOME was located at Second and J streets. It was built circa 1853 by the father of Mrs. Livingston and Mrs. Mercy Mullin.

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## Remembering some of Eureka's earliest homes

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Located on Second Street near J Street, this house was built by a man named **CAMPBELL**, who was connected to the lumber industry.



Built for a man named  $Judge\ Brock$ , this house was located on D Street near Fourth Street.



THE WILSON HOME was located on Second Street between L and M streets. It was built by Sandy Wilson, who was the brother of Sarah Carson, the wife of lumber baron William Carson.


